

ASSESSMENT PROCESS (cont.)

Once your dog passes the first stage, the assessor will discuss with you the second stage of the assessment. This will take place in an Aged Care Home.

Pre-requirements for the Second Stage are:

- ♦ receipt of Police Clearance and
- ♦ completion of the Golden Retriever Club Membership form

Second stage – Aged Care Home

Your dog will need to be comfortable walking on different surfaces, like linoleum to carpet, up and down stairs, down narrow corridors. He/she will be exposed to people using walking frames, wheelchairs, high beds, walking canes, different smells, food trolleys and will need to be comfortable with people walking close behind, touching him/her suddenly and unexpectedly.

It is perfectly normal for a dog to show some anxiety the first time it goes into a Home. The assessor will decide whether your dog will cope long term or whether the environment may be too stressful. Some dogs may cope better in a smaller Aged Care Home.

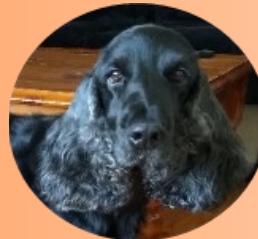
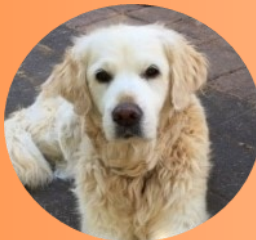

DOG ASSESSMENT CHECKLIST

WHAT WE ARE LOOKING FOR IN A CARING CANINE COMPANION

<input type="checkbox"/>	Generally aged 2-10 years (there is flexibility)
<input type="checkbox"/>	Healthy (for example, no signs of pain due to arthritis)
<input type="checkbox"/>	Friendly and outgoing
<input type="checkbox"/>	Enjoys human interaction
<input type="checkbox"/>	Obedient and has manners
<input type="checkbox"/>	Is comfortable with being handled all over each having mouth, ears, tail and legs handled
<input type="checkbox"/>	Has had some obedience training and knows how to heel, sit, stay and laydown on command

UNDESIRABLE BEHAVIOUR – CONTACT OUR ASSESSOR FOR HELPFUL TIPS PRIOR TO ASSESSMENT

<input type="checkbox"/>	Paws or jumps for attention
<input type="checkbox"/>	Jumps on furniture
<input type="checkbox"/>	Snatches food
<input type="checkbox"/>	Steals food off the table
<input type="checkbox"/>	Hasn't had any obedience training



UNSAFE BEHAVIOUR – PLEASE DO NOT APPLY

<input type="checkbox"/>	Has shown any form of aggression to a person, child or animal
<input type="checkbox"/>	Likes to play by using its teeth, mouthy
<input type="checkbox"/>	Is anxious and doesn't cope in new environments
<input type="checkbox"/>	Barks and whines excessively for no reason

ASSESSMENT PROCESS

OUR ASSESSMENT PROCESS CONSISTS OF TWO STAGES

First stage – Low stress environment

One of our assessors will contact you to organise and book a suitable time to assess your dog and to meet you.

Frequency, Location and Duration

On a Sunday, generally once a month at Kensington Gardens, Burnside, and will take up to 30 minutes – if times and/or place are unsuitable, other arrangements can be discussed with the assessor at the time of booking.
